

Special Programs and Features

Book Fair:

Book fairs are held in the fall and spring. Proceeds from the fairs are used to purchase books for the elementary school library. At the book fair, students and parents are given the opportunity to view and purchase the books. Hours are scheduled after school and in the evening on several days so parents can visit the fair to view/purchase books.

Catholic Schools Week:

This week long, nation-wide observance celebrates Catholic education and helps the public focus on the contributions Catholic schools make to our country. It takes place the last week in January. Each year, a nationwide theme is adopted in which daily activities are planned by staff and students. These special activities during the week help everyone celebrate as we recognize the importance of Catholic schools in our local, state and national communities.

Discipline Policy:

The discipline policy is based on Christian principles to instill respect and consideration for the dignity of self and others.

Health Screening:

Vision and hearing screening for students are conducted annually by local agencies.

Music Programs/Musicals:

The elementary students showcase their vocal and instrumental talents at two concerts during the year – one in December and one in the spring.

The Middle/Sr. High school students have several musical programs throughout the course of the year, including fall, December and spring concerts. The drama and music clubs schedule various productions during the year, including the school musical. The Music and Fine Arts Boosters assist with the school music programs and activities throughout the year.

Newsletters/Website:

Monthly school wide newsletters and tuition statements are E-mailed July – May. The Development Office emails a “Thursday Folder” which contains upcoming notices, updates and event information. Information can be accessed on the school website as well at: www.burlingtonnotredame.com. Or on the Burlington Notre Dame App.

Non-Catholic Students:

Students of all faiths are welcome at Burlington Notre Dame. The school system’s moral and ethical values and much of its religious instruction are common to any Christian faith. Non-Catholic students are required to attend religion classes and are encouraged to share their faith experiences.

Burlington Notre Dame Foundation:

The Burlington Notre Dame Foundation is dedicated to providing financial support for Notre Dame Schools by securing gift support from a wide circle of Alumni, Parents, Parishioners and Friends of Notre Dame. The Foundation receives donations that can be designated to one of the following funds: Capital Improvement/Building Fund, Endowment Fund for faculty and curriculum support, Restricted General Fund, Tuition Assistance Fund, which includes St. Jude and specific family sponsored funds, and Retirement Fund. The principal of these funds is restricted, and only a percentage of the interest earned is distributed to the school on a quarterly/semiannual basis. Since Notre Dame School does not receive school property tax dollars, the Foundation’s financial support is critical to the success of teachers, students and their families.

Red Ribbon Week:

This is a community wide event held in the fall that is individually coordinated by each school. Red Ribbon week focuses on educating children about the dangers of drug use and on promoting healthy life choices. There are a variety of school-based activities and opportunities for discussion during the week.

School Bus Transportation:

The Burlington Community School District provides free transportation for eligible students in grades K-12. To qualify, students in grades K-4 must live 1 mile or more from Notre Dame; students in grades 5-8 must live 2 miles or more from Notre Dame and 9-12 students must live 3 miles or more from Notre Dame. National School Lunch Program:

Nutritionally balanced meals are available to all students, preschool through grade 12. Free and reduced-priced lunches are available for those who qualify and are approved.

Spiritual/Weekly Mass:

The curriculum includes a Catholic approach with formal religious instruction, regular school Masses and liturgical activities, plus classroom visits by vocational religious speakers. Mass is celebrated every Tuesday alternating between K – 5, All School and Secondary in the elementary or high school gymnasium. This Mass is a scheduled community Mass and adults are encouraged to attend. Teachers plan these liturgies with their classes, and students function as servers, lectors and song leaders.

Volunteer Opportunities:

Parents and other family members, as well as parishioners are needed to volunteer their time, talent and treasure through a variety of activities. Classroom learning projects, playground supervision, extracurricular activities, fundraising, chaperoning, office work and building maintenance and repair are just some of the opportunities available to those who wish to take an active role in our school community.

Athletics:

At the middle school level, the variety of available sports includes soccer, track, football, volleyball, basketball, and cheerleading. Wrestling, tennis, swimming, cross country and golf are also available to sr. high school students.

A Tradition of Excellence

The tradition and the practice of our school system are to provide each student with a total Christian learning experience. While academic achievement will always remain our principal goal, we offer the opportunity and encourage our students to be involved in a variety of activities, including music, student council, scouting, a number of clubs from Get A Grip to the Musical and athletics. We are a family, helping and supporting one another, working to be the best that we can be. We are more than just a school system. Come see for yourself.

History:

The roots of the Burlington Notre Dame Catholic School system go back to the late 1800s. Each of the three parishes in Burlington operated its own elementary school before the turn of the century. Shortly after the founding of St. Mary Parish in West Burlington, an elementary school was also established in that community. Catholic secondary education has always been a joint parish venture, with forerunners of the present high school being Lourdes Academy, St. John's Commercial School, St. Paul's High and Burlington Catholic High School.

In 1969, the four parishes merged their operations under a central board of pastors and lay representatives. Thus, began Burlington Area Catholic Schools, with its three attendance centers – St Paul's, St. John's and Notre Dame.

In May of 1996, the ground-breaking ceremony was held for the new Notre Dame Elementary School at 700 S Roosevelt. All elementary grades and preschool at St. Paul's and St. John's moved to the new 2.5 million dollar facility for the 1997 fall semester.

In November 2001, the School Board and the Regional Parish Councils approved a name change for the school system from Burlington Area Catholic Schools to Burlington Notre Dame, Inc. – moving toward the future with one name and one goal – to provide quality education in a Christian atmosphere.

Accreditation and Size:

Ours is a total preschool through 12th grade school system. Our preschool is licensed by the Department of Human Services. The school system is fully accredited by the Iowa Department of Education, the Diocese of Davenport and the National Catholic Education Association. It serves our two local parishes and their outlying communities, with a total enrollment of over 400.

Philosophy:

Burlington Notre Dame exists because we believe that God has a central place in the education of our children. As Christians, we believe in Jesus Christ as Lord, and we strive to carry out His last command to "go forth and teach all nations." We seek to build a Christian community through word and example. We recognize that education is a lifelong process, and that our school is a facilitator in encouraging each individual to grow in knowledge and faith.

Governance:

Burlington Notre Dame is under the jurisdiction of the Diocese of Davenport. There is the local governance board comprised of voting and non-voting members including two parish priests, 6 lay persons elected from each of the two parishes served by the school system, administrators and teacher representatives. These lay members are seated on a staggered basis, following annual parish selections. Each member serves a three-year term of office.

Operating Revenues:

Approximately 15 percent of the money used to operate Burlington Notre Dame is derived from parish assessments. The remaining funds are obtained primarily through tuition (64 percent) and fundraising and gifts (10 percent). The Notre Dame Foundation was organized to provide added funds (11%) for the school system.

Student Registration:

Registration takes place in late winter/early spring. New students may enroll at any time by making an appointment with the school principal. All transfer students must have their past school records forwarded to Burlington Notre Dame. Final registration for grades 6-12 occurs in early August in order to finalize academic schedules.

Health Requirements:

School officials will request an up-to-date certificate of health and verification that the student has been immunized according to Iowa Code. Exceptions to these requirements may only be allowed for medical or religious reasons as outlined in the Iowa Code.

Fundraising

Fun Fest:

This fall festival is coordinated and sponsored by the Parent Teacher Organization and is one of the biggest fundraisers for the organization. Proceeds are used for school improvements, as well as provide educational support in our classrooms. This family focused carnival is held in the school gymnasiums. Volunteers are always needed and welcomed.

God's Portion Day:

God's Portion Day is held in the fall and is a major fund-raising event for Notre Dame Schools that involves the whole community. This event is centered around a large live auction where local businesses, parents and parishioners donate items. Traditionally, the kindergarten classes have made quilts that have proven to be quite popular auction items. A raffle drawing is held offering a "large ticket" top prize and several smaller prizes. Elementary and middle/senior high school students also help raise money for the event through various activities that include school bake sales, student auction and raffle ticket sales. The success of God's Portion Day depends on the efforts of our total school community. It is a fun day that you won't want to miss!

Scrip:

The Scrip program uses gift certificates bought from local and national businesses. Notre Dame purchases these gift certificates at a discount and sells them to families and friends for the full value. The discounts range from 2-25% of the face value. 2% of your total Scrip purchases go toward a credit on your Notre Dame tuition. Scrip sales between April 1st and March 30th will be credited on your final May tuition statement.

Pot O' Blue & Gold:

Each spring, the Notre Dame Foundation begins the Pot O' Blue & Gold Raffle ticket sale. Each family is encouraged to sell these \$100 raffle tickets. A limited number of tickets are sold which helps increase the odds of winning one of many cash prizes ranging from \$200 to the grand prize of \$100,000. The proceeds from this event go toward the Notre Dame Foundation Faculty Support Fund, curriculum, technology and the general budget.

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Organizations

Booster Clubs:

Notre Dame Booster organizations include the Athletic Boosters and Music and Fine Arts Boosters. Volunteers provide their time and talent to raise funds and support for these booster clubs.

Parent Teacher Organization:

This is a volunteer organization in which all parents of Notre Dame Elementary students (K-5) are members. PTO meets numerous times throughout the school year and supports the educational needs of the children through various fundraisers and volunteer efforts. The major fundraising event is Fun Fest held each fall. The proceeds from the PTO fundraising goes toward school improvements and purchasing supplies for our classrooms that are not in the operating budget.

School Board of Education:

The school board meets on the 4th Monday of every month at 6 pm in the high school library. The meetings are open and parents are encouraged to attend. Meeting minutes are posted on the school website. There are 5 committees that fall under the direction of the School Board of Education: Building & Grounds, Policy, Finance, Marketing and School Improvement Advisory. Membership on these committees includes board and non-board members.

Scouts – Boy and Girl:

There are active scouting troops available for all age levels of Notre Dame students.

A Memorable Experience:

Notre Dame faculty and students seek to build a Christian community through word and example and to help each other to become all that God wants them to be.

The high school years represent a special time in the student's life. Notre Dame provides a creative blend of religious, academic and social experiences which serve to make these years truly memorable. This mix of activities helps form the character of the Notre Dame graduate. The small size of the student body enables every student to participate in a variety of activities.

Facilities:

Include a chapel, library, science lab, cafeteria, gymnasium, and lighted fields for soccer, baseball, softball.

Academic Programs:

Notre Dame offers a wide variety of courses, including a strong religious education program. Students may also participate in competitive athletics and numerous clubs and social events. The overall curriculum is built solidly around basic academic subjects, taught in progressive sequence and presented as college-preparatory courses. The core curriculum and graduation requirements meet the admission standards of virtually all U.S. universities.

Graduation Requirements:

4 credits (four years) in Religion, English, and Social Studies, 3 credits in Science and Math, 2 credits in Physical Education, 2 credits in Foreign Language, .5 credits in Health and a minimum of 3.5 credits in elective courses.

Band:

High School students have the opportunity to perform at music concerts and other programs throughout the school year.

Clubs:

There are a variety of High School clubs and organizations available in which students may participate, including National Honor Society, Student Council, Get A Grip, Spirit Club, Broken Wing Repair Crew, Speech, Debate, Musical, and Leo Club.

Conferences and Evaluations/Report Cards:

Students and parents can view progress reports and grades reports on-line through PowerSchool. Parents are issued a password where grades are updated on a weekly basis. At the High School level, parents are encouraged to access progress reports, grades and report cards on-line. A parent password is required. Ineligibility for extracurricular activities is assessed on a weekly basis. Parent/Teacher conferences are optional in the fall and spring.

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Confirmation:

Confirmation is generally held in the spring for freshman students. Preparation for the reception of this sacrament requires each student to participate in at least one service project. Students must also write letters to their pastors stating why they wish to be confirmed and explaining what their service projects were.

Graduation:

Graduation activities take place in late May and include a Baccalaureate Mass, Mom/Dad Banquet, Senior Awards ceremony, Marian Prayer Service and the Graduation ceremony for family and friends.

Honors Recognition:

An Honors Brunch is held one time during each of the fall and spring semesters to recognize grade 9-12 students for their academic successes. An invited guest speaker also attends the brunch and offers students congratulations and encouragement in their school-based endeavors.

ISASP

The test is a state exam given every spring to all students in grades 6-11. Parents may view results on line. Those results contain comparisons of student performance at the state level.

National School Lunch Program:

A free and subsidized lunch program is available with menus varying daily. Parents periodically deposit money in their child's lunch account. Bar coded lunch cards are issued to each student.

Registrar Services:

The High School has a registrar available on campus to help students schedule classes and help parents regarding the college application process, financial aid opportunities and arrange on site visits with various college representatives.

Vice Versa Dance:

Sponsored by the Student Council, this dance is traditionally one of role reversal, where the girls invite the boys to attend this dance.

Homecoming:

During basketball season, the High School celebrates Homecoming with a variety of daily activities on campus.

Prom and Promenade:

The prom is an annual springtime event hosted by the junior class with parent volunteer assistance. Promenade is the prelude to the prom, where couples are introduced as they walk across the stage. Students can then be photographed both professionally and by parents before the evening's dance.

The Notre Dame Catholic School System recognizes that education is a lifelong process, and that its school is a facilitator in encouraging each individual to grow in his/her knowledge and faith.

The educational program of the Middle School is designed to provide basic academics in progressively broader dimensions. Students are enrolled in a series of courses that teach them to master these basics. All courses are taught with a specifically Christian approach. This enables students to study and grow in their faith, and challenges them to live its principles. The goal is to educate students to become responsible adults, able to serve as an influencing Christian force in our society.

The Middle School classrooms include an art room, and science lab. Students also have access to the library, cafeteria, chapel and gymnasium.

Staff:

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ISASP:

The test is a state exam given every spring to all students in grades 6-11. Parents may view results on line. Those results contain comparisons of student performance at the state level.

National School Lunch Program:

A free and subsidized lunch program is available with menus varying daily. Parents periodically put money on their student's lunch card. The cards have a personal barcode associated with each student. Students are responsible for taking care of their card.

School Pictures:

During the first week of school professional photographers come to Notre Dame to take students' school pictures. Retake dates are also set in the late fall for those students who were absent or not happy with the way the pictures look. All dates are announced on the ND website.

Promotion/Class Trip – 8th Grade:

This is a rite of passage celebrated by the 8th grade students as they transition to high school. This event takes place the night before the 8th grade class trip, which is generally the last day of school. The promotion consists of a prayer service for students and their families and is followed by a reception that is planned and prepared by the 7th grade students and their parents. An 8th grade dance follows the reception which is planned, prepared and decorated by the 7th grade parents. Eighth grade students spend the year raising money through a variety of fundraisers to pay for a day long trip which usually occurs on the last day of school. Parent volunteers provide supervision for the day long trip.

6th – 7th Grade Class Outing:

This end of the year celebration occurs on the last day of the school year. Students spend a fun day under school supervision.

Guidance Counseling/Registrar:

A full-time guidance counselor and registrar is on staff to oversee class scheduling, career investigation, academic guidance, state testing and to help students with personal growth and development.

The Notre Dame Elementary School is equipped to meet the needs of young students with appropriately designed classrooms, a music room, library, gymnasium and playground. Each classroom is equipped with smartboards and we are a 1:1 school.

Basic Christian Education:

Religious instruction is the heart of the education program, with special emphasis on the growth of sound Christian morals and values. The objective is to develop individuals who are well educated and prepared to fulfill their duties to self, family, community, church and God.

Age Requirements:

In accordance with Iowa law, those entering Kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 15th in the year in which they enroll. Students entering the First grade must be six years old by September 15th. The student must provide a birth certificate, a baptismal certificate or other proof of age prior to beginning classes. Immunizations must be current to attend school.

The Elementary Program:

BASIC ACADEMIC SUBJECTS:

Mathematics; Science; Social Studies; Language Arts (reading, writing, phonics, literature, spelling and handwriting)

RELIGION: Classroom instruction on the Sacraments, Commandments, Creed, Scriptures; preparation for initiation into the Sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Reconciliation in 2nd grade; special Advent and Lenten observances; communal penance services; participation in Community Service activities to help develop the student's faith and sense of Christian responsibility and service.

ART & MUSIC: Art instruction and general music is provided in kindergarten through 5th grade and instrumental music starting in 5th grade.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION & COCURRICULAR ACTIVITIES: Notre Dame has certified P.E. teacher who focuses on a variety of activities stressing fitness.

ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES: Participation in the Accelerated Reader Program; field trips; guest speakers.

BAND: Band is offered to students beginning in grade 5. Band students have the opportunity to perform at music concerts and other programs throughout the school year.

HEALTH SCREENING: Periodic screening for vision, speech and hearing impairments.

Homeroom Parents:

Each fall the Parent Teacher Organization asks for volunteers to act as homeroom parents for grades K-5. Homeroom parents' duties include the coordination of parties in the classrooms throughout the year, and to help at the booths at Fun Fest. Periodically throughout the year, the homeroom parents are asked to solicit parent help for various functions that may be happening at school.

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First Communion/First Reconciliation:

Second grade students prepare to receive the sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. First Reconciliation is generally held in November. First Eucharist takes place in the spring.

ISASP:

The Test is a state exam given every spring to all students in grades 2-5. Parents may view results on line. Those results contain comparisons of student performance at the state level.

Kindergarten Round-Up:

In early March, Burlington Notre Dame holds a Kindergarten Round-Up to pre-register children for the fall semester. At round-up time, parents may visit the classroom, meet with staff and learn about the kindergarten program.

National School Lunch Program/Playground Supervision:

A hot lunch program is available with menus varying daily. Notre Dame offers a daily hot lunch program following the guidelines of the national school lunch program. A free or subsidized lunch is available for qualifying families. Elementary lunch is divided into two periods, K-2 and 3-5. Parents have the opportunity to volunteer as recess supervisors with VIRTUS training.

Report Cards/Conferences/Evaluations:

Students receive report cards quarterly and at midterm and can be accessed online via PowerSchool through the school website. Periodic evaluations of student performance are held at all school levels. Parent/Teacher conferences are scheduled in the fall with optional conferences offered in the spring. Parents are encouraged to view student progress, midterm reports and report cards online through PowerSchool. Parents are assigned a password for this online access.

School Pictures:

Each fall and spring professional photographers come to Notre Dame to take school pictures with a retake date available at a later time.

Uniform Sales:

Mother Goosebumps of Galesburg is a provider of our school skirt and jumper uniforms. Each August, before the start of school, the company has an on campus uniform sale for Kindergarten through grade 5 students. Uniforms can also be found at Target or Kohls and also on Amazon.

Jean Days:

This casual dress day happens periodically throughout the year. Monthly calendars/newsletters provide the exact dates. Jeans may be worn if they are in good condition and suitable for school. Clothing with offensive words or graphics may not be worn. If a student's attire is deemed unacceptable, parents will be notified and a change of clothes will be required.

Kids Count Bank:

The Kids Count Bank is staffed by 4th and 5th grade students under the supervision of a faculty advisor and staff from Farmers and Merchants Bank. The student staff serves as members of the Board of Directors and as tellers. Account applications are available in the school office and require a parent's signature (the student's social security number is also required). On bank day (usually Thursday) students may deposit or withdraw money from their accounts.

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Little Nike Day Care

(Located in Notre Dame Elementary School)

The Day Care program offers a state-licensed child care program for Burlington Notre Dame students in preschool through grade 6.

The Program is staffed by a director with State of Iowa credentials and an aide. The program strives to provide individual attention, security, consistency, and fair treatment for children of working parents. The center provides toys and activities for the children as well as areas for them to do school work if preferred.

Hours:

The program is an extension of the child's day and follows the yearly school calendar. Hours are: 7:00 am – 5:30 pm. A summer program is available for any area children age 3- grade 6. Hours of operation are from 7:00 am. – 5:30 pm.

Food:

Fees include a light breakfast and a nutritious after school snack. Preschoolers who attend the day care have the option of participating in our lunch program.

Fees:

Registration fee is \$20 per family. Hourly fees may be obtained by calling the Day Care room at 319-752-4274. Hourly charges are due upon receipt the following week. If a family uses the daycare program during the school year, there is no additional registration fee to use the summer program.

Registration Procedures:

A pre-registration is held in the spring of the year. Final registration is conducted during our annual Elementary School Open House prior to the beginning of school. New families may register at any time by calling 319-752-4274. When parents register their children, they should be prepared to provide:

- A schedule of the days and times each child will be attending the Center.
- Emergency information – parent and/or guardian home and work telephone numbers and physician's name and telephone number.
- Names of the person or persons who will bring the child/children to school and pick them up. Staff members will release children only to an authorized person.

Please Note: Your child may not bring toys from home. Appropriate and acceptable behavior must be followed to maintain enrollment in the program.

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Little Nike Preschool

(Located in Notre Dame Elementary School)

The Little Nike Preschool strives to:

- Develop positive attitudes among children about learning and school.
- Promote the total development of the pre-Kindergarten child, including social, emotional, physical and cognitive skills.
- Help each child realize his or her importance in God's world.

Program:

The curriculum includes art, circle time, learning activities, religion, development of gross and fine motor skills, music, physical education, story time, supervised play and snack time.

Schedule: Little Nike Preschool offers a variety of session times and days for both 3 and 4 year old students. Three year olds attend 2 days per week, while 4 year olds attend 5 days (Monday-Friday) either in the morning or afternoon. Program days/times may vary from year to year.

The three-year old program has a maximum of 12 students per class and the four-year old program has a maximum of 18 students per class.

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Staff:

Each class has one teacher and one aide. The program and staff are licensed by the Department of Human Services. Physical education is taught by a certified teacher.

Registration:

Preschool round-up/registration is conducted in early March. Both programs follow the age requirements set by the State of Iowa – children must be 3 or 4 years old by September 15th to qualify for the desired program.

The Pre-Registration process for 3 yr. and 4 yr. old preschool is as follows (for the following year):

January 1 – Current preschool students have the first opportunity to pre-register for the following year, followed by Burlington Notre Dame Parents and parishioners of Divine Mercy Parish. A registration fee of \$25 and completed registration form is required to secure your child's place in a particular preschool class.

February 1 – Pre-registration is open to the general community.
